Increased number of Chinook's Edge students taking advantage of summer career-building experiences

While summer can be thought of as a time to relax and take a break, an increasing number of Chinook's Edge students are using the summer months to build their career readiness. This is also a part of the school division's goal to provide career pathway learning to students to prepare them for their future with career readiness skills.

The division had 236 students completing summer off campus programming, an increase from the 184 students who participated in the summer of 2023. All 12 Chinook's Edge schools with students in Grades 10 to 12 had students in the program. Of the 236 students working over the summer of 2024:

- 11 had Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) placements
- 225 were work experience students

Also, of the 236 students, 63 found their placement because of the support of the division's partner organization,

<u>CAREERS</u>. CAREERS plays an important role in Alberta, bringing together industry, schools, government, and communities to guide youth into successful career paths.

Aida Hingst, a Grade 12 student attending Ecole Olds High School, was one of the division's participating students. She worked at Brandt Ag in Olds.

Aida says that as she enters her final year of high school, "my confidence is at an all time high. The support from my school and all of the people working off campus, dual credit and Olds College is fantastic. I have a plan academically as I finish high school and transition into post secondary schooling."
