

Large atlas highlights Indigenous history for École H.J. Cody students

École H.J. Cody students, in Sylvan Lake, had the opportunity over the last few weeks to learn more about Indigenous history in a unique way.

Teacher Melissa McQueen borrowed a large atlas from the Alberta Teachers' Association, and asked Indigenous partner Clare Butterfly to share insights about Indigenous peoples to students.

"Students were able to really see the impact, in person, and the scale of impact of language and residential schools on different Indigenous groups in Canada," says McQueen. "A few students were able to make a significant connection between what we were learning for transatlantic slave trade and the overlap with policy in Canada historically."

McQueen says, "This map and the timeline that went around it offered students the ability to make these connections on their own without prompting." "The atlas encourages exploration and, while Clare Butterfly was telling stories, students were able to listen while simultaneously discovering things that relate to important places, names, locations and languages," she says.

McQueen says she has been able to use the atlas in previous years and appreciated the resource because it *"opens up space for discovery and helps us to look at Canada from a new perspective."*

McQueen says, "The size of the map is one of the best things about it. It takes up space. A lot of it. In a world where Indigenous culture, language and knowledge has been marginalized in educational spaces, this map takes over space and pushes Indigenous knowledge to the forefront of our learning."
